Stream 3: Public anthropology

The term 'public anthropology' entered the vocabulary of this discipline in the 1990s (A. Tsing, R. Borofsky)

It differs from and overlaps with other terms:

Engaged anthropology

Applied anthropology

Participatory research

'Going public': popularization & politicization

The main components of the process of 'going public' are **popularization** and **politicization** (D. Fassin 2018).

Popularization means making intellectual products accessible, attractive and comprehensible to wider audience.

Politicization refers to the contribution that scholars can make to forums where issues are debated with and by concerned and willing individuals, and acted upon by authorities and other individuals with the power to decide on these issues.

Politics in the term politicization refers not to the political arena, but to polis (discussion) and policy (action). Politicization refers, in brief, to engagement.

- Public, different publics
- Different forms of writing
- Taking advantage of digital media
- Collaboration with other disciplines
- Art
- Engaging experience

Climate Change 2022: Impacts, Adaptation and Vulnerability

Chapter 9 assesses climate change impacts and risks, vulnerability as well as enabling conditions, barriers and options for adaptation and climate resilient development in Africa.








Speaking of Race · Top 5 Scientific Racism



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

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
